1. A grape used for wine making? Malbec and Cabernet Sauvignon both score 2, Pelaverga, Merlot, Nebbiolo, Primitivo, Tannat, Albarino, Cinsaut, Grillo, Gamaret, Xynomavro, Negrara, Muscatelle, Erbaluce, Sauvignon Blanc, Furmint, Tazzelenghe, Pinot Grigio, Shiraz, Sylvaner, Bastardo, Pinotage, and Grenache Noir all score 3

I must admit that I hadn't realized there were quite so many. This question was inspired by finding a Uruguayan Tannat wine. I didn't realize that Uruguay made wines nor had I heard of Tannat so I had to try it — sadly it was quite disappointing. Last week, I was in the Rio Grande de Sul state of Brazil, where they also grow wine. I tried a pleasant Malvasia (white, another grape I'd not heard of) and bought a Teragildo. I did check all the answers and could find reference to them all.

- 2. A strong spirit (40% or more alcohol)? Vodka (3), Whiskey (3), Whisky (3), Rum (3), Orujo (2), Absinthe (2), Gin (2); Ouzo, Green Chartreuse, Grappa, Strega, Midvinterblot, Bourbon, Brandy, Tequila, Awamori score 4. My intent was the type of drink rather than brand, and as most people interpreted it this way, I rules couple of brand answers as their generic spirit. There are differences between Scotch Whisky and American or Irish Whiskey, so I counted these separately. Awamori is a strong rice spirit unique to Okinawa and the Yaeyama islands of Japan. We enjoyed it many years ago, but it's almost impossible to find in the US, although I did have a glass in Vegas a few years back.
- 3. Å fruit used to make Schnapps? Apple (7), Peach (4), Raspberry (3), Cranberry (2), Blueberry (2), Cherry (2), Lemon (2): Plum, Strawberry, Pear and Pomegranate score 8.

Raspberrys (himbeern) produce himbeergeist, that I often used to drink with our German Sales Manager when we were travelling together in Germany. Walnuß (walnut) is my favourite Schnapps, but I only ever saw this in Nurnberg. I chose to allow other fruits as I didn't specify German Schnapps types, although I meant to.

4. A US Microbrewery? Sam Adams scores 2 and everything else scores 3.

Thanks to everyone who researched Pennsylvania beers for me; I currently have a crate of Kona beers to enjoy. Troegs is a Philadelphia microbrewery whose beers are easily found in the Valley. They make some very nice and reliable ales. Sam Adams and the Boston Beer company are one and the same as far as I can tell.

5. An Alcoholic Cocktail? Screwdriver, Gin and Tonic and Pina Colada (2): Farnell, Caiparinha, Crowbar, Negroni, Angel Face, Tom and Jerry, Slow Comfortable Screw Against the Wall, Yellow Sock, Rum Blazer, Harvey Wallbanger, Mint Sunrise, Bloody Mary, Staten Island Ferry, Tamagozake, Gin Sling, Avatar, Four Horsemen, Mojito, Daiquiri, Martini and Gloom Chaser all score 3.

Gloom Chaser is my favourite cocktail at the Bethlehem Bookstore Speak-Easy. It's 1 part Curacao Orange, 1 part Grand Marnier, 1 part Grenadine and 1 part lemon juice.

6. A soft drink? Coke / Coca Cola (7), Irn Bru (3), Lemonade (2): A&W, Tomato Juice, Traubi, Guarana, Vimto, Spruce Beer, Orange Spot, Vira blåtira. Orange Juice, Prune Juice, Diet Pepsi, Strawberry Soda, Dandelion and Burdock, J2O and Granadilla Twist all score 8.

Guarana is the soft drink of Brazil – I don't think I've seen it anywhere else. I think it's cherry based.

In this round, the top scorers this round was **Michael Pargman**, **Howard Bishop** and **Conrad von Metzke** who all scored 28 from a maximum of 29.

On what basis do you base your contention that chess is not a sport? Or is this just some unconscious petty prejudice that you've just shared?

From http://www.oxforddictionaries.com/us/definition/american_english/sport, but also other sites that I found searching "Definition of Sport" - An activity involving physical exertion and skill in which an individual or team competes against another or others for entertainment. My own interpretation of a sport is that it is an activity that requires physical activity and skill - chess to my mind is a highly skilled, mental game.

There are many activities that I would consider sports that are not included in the list, in part because they are not international enough or because the sports are now dominated by professional organizations. The IOC list does not include soccer, tennis or Kabaadi. Regardless of their lack of inclusion by the IOC, I would definitely define darts and 10 pin bowling as sports - both require the physical act of throwing an object, accurately and repeatedly at a target. I do not consider the physical action of moving the chess pieces part of the skill of chess - the skill is where you move them to.

I think you are being selective. I undertook the same google search and the oxforddictionaries.com definition did come up first. I have two issues concerning your interpretation of this definition: first you overlook that without the (comparatively small) physical exertion of moving the pieces there isnt a game of chess, but secondly I think you understate the physical impact of playing chess at the highest level (http://www.chess.com/article/view/chess-and-physical-wellbeing) for hours at a time. Turning to wiki, it appears that a more authoritative definition of what constitutes a sport is provided by SportAccord: Definition See also: Game § Definitions

Show Jumping, an equestrian sport

The precise definition of what separates a sport from other leisure activities varies between sources. The closest to an international agreement on a definition is provided by SportAccord, which is the association for all the largest international sports federations (including association football, athletics, cycling, tennis, equestrian sports and more), and is therefore the de facto representative of international sport.

SportAccord uses the following criteria, determining that a sport should:[1]

have an element of competition

be in no way harmful to any living creature

not rely on equipment provided by a single supplier (excluding proprietary games such as arena football) not rely on any "luck" element specifically designed into the sport

They also recognise that sport can be primarily physical (such as rugby or athletics), primarily mind (such as chess or go), predominantly motorised (such as Formula 1 or powerboating), primarily co-ordination (such as billiard sports), or primarily animal-supported (such as equestrian sport).[1]

There has been an increase in the application of the term "sport" to a wider set of non-physical challenges such as electronic sports, especially due to the large scale of participation and organised competition, but these are not widely recognised by mainstream sports organisations

That seems more plausible?

I'm not sure if our Chess is a Sport discussion has finished but might your explanation of why you allowed Jerusalem to be an African capital city be a little inconsistent with the reasoning of Chess not being a sport? (i.e. plenty of Web evidence that it is a Sport).

Regarding the Chess discussion, we probably didn't finish this as work here went crazy and I had almost no time to deal with any Pig enquiries. As noted, I can also find websites that would not describe Chess as a sport. I allowed Jerusalem as the first websites I checked did indicate that Jerusalem and Israel could be considered part of Africa and I personally was not sure. Ultimately, in this type of game (especially now the Internet is available for research), I have to make the final call. I must admit that in other BPD games, where I send in unusual or potentially debatable answers, I usually include a reference in my orders. 

Questions

I am still struggling with this game, could you explain what the numbers in the tile/goods table mean

The numbers in the tiles / goods table refer to the number of plantation tiles or goods that are available in the 'bank'. New plantations are drawn randomly after then end of each settler phase and these will then make up the 6 plantations that are offered for the next settler phase. The quarries are not offered but can be taken either by the player who takes the settler role or any player with a manned construction hut. To be honest, this information is unlikely to be used by the players but I keep it to make sure I don't offer too many of the same type of plantation

The goods are the number of goods available for production when someone takes the craftsman. This is more important as the number of goods are fixed so when a type of good (corn, indigo etc) run out, players can no longer produce this. Starting for the player who takes the craftsman, each player produces as many goods as they can. Each manned corn plantation produces one corn, but all other goods (indigo, sugar, tobacco and coffee) require both a manned plantation and manned production building (i.e. to produce one indigo, you need an indigo plantation and an indigo plant (small). Each must be manned, that is have a settler placed on both plantation and building (this is done in the Mayor phase). Note, that all buildings need to be manned to function.

Comment

Michael Pargman: I vote against Bob's proposal. I agree with him that the Russian railway is seldom (ever?) used in any regular game, and I wouldn't object to that rule change if it had been done before game start (well actually, before selecting start cities). When doing such a change, you may also want to consider changing the rules so that it would be allowed to build on the Russian rail routes after round 6 (thereby taking over parts or all of the track from the Russians). But making such a change in mid-game completely changes game strategies for how far you have to build to get reach to specific areas in the North and for the Transcontinental races.

There were no other comments so we will continue the game as originally planned.



You have to hand it to Southampton FC for falling on their feet after losing most of their star players and the manager too. But new manager Ronald Koeman has recruited some excellent replacements, fully backed by the board (being allowed to spend most of the transfer income). 



THE DEADLINE FOR VARIABLE PIG (Nero dei Nebrodi) is Wednedsday 26th November 2014

The **Nero Siciliano** or **Nero dei Nebrodi** is a breed of domestic pig from the Mediterranean island of Sicily,



mainly in the province of Messina and particularly in the Monti Nebrodi. It is one of the six autochthonous pig breeds recognised by the Ministero delle Politiche Agricole Alimentari e Forestali, the Italian ministry of agriculture and forestry. The bree is raised both for fresh meat and for salumi. Animals for direct consumption are usually slaughtered at 6-7 month while those for the production of preserved meats are usually slaughtered at 10-11 months. The principal salumi are the Salame Sant'Angelo and Prosciutto di Suino Nero dei Nebrodi.
